A Time for Spirited Kids

We are pleased to announce that the United Methodist Foundation of New England awarded Fisk a \$2,000 grant for its adaptive church worship service. The grant provides seed money for resources, supplies and outreach as we welcome families seeking a more flexible, less structured worship experience for children and youth with diagnoses and challenges that make attending a traditional worship service difficult. The 30-minute monthly service will be held at 4:30 p.m., generally on the third Sunday of each month. Worship will be followed by a light meal and time of fellowship. While the service is designed for people with special needs, everyone is welcome to join us.

In March, we talked about the ways the armor of God is like a turtle's shell! This month we will think about the work/struggle a caterpillar goes through in transforming into a butterfly and compare it to our journey as we strive to be more Christ-like.


Family Promise

Finance & Stewardship

As the Finance Committee continues its work to oversee church finances, we thought it would be a great idea to give you a glimpse into the process and the value of your participation in this process.

Fisk finances are in the hands of good and faithful stewards. We have a budget and are working within the confines of it. Not all churches are so fortunate; some struggle with cash flow and control of their finances. Not Fisk! Our budget is drafted in January by the Finance Committee using data from past years and anticipations for next year. It is then reviewed and approved by the Administrative Board. Our financial journey through the year is monitored monthly at the Finance Committee meetings. Our Treasurer and Financial Secretary have their tasks well in hand. The great thing is that this control of our process has been in place, and stable for many, many years.

This year, income and expenses are tracking expectations. Although a balanced budget was approved, a small but anticipated increase in mission shares indicates there may be a small deficit to close. Fortunately, our congregation pledges to support Fisk's ministries, staff, missions and building. As a congregation, Fisk UMC is very active with all sorts of outreach, fellowship and ministry, activities, and mission. In view of this, we have a monthly, "We are Fisk" moment during the Worship service on the second Sunday. This helps us understand the connection of our activities and our on-going giving.

The budget process continues to be difficult and sometimes challenging; especially for the last few years, and might continue. Fortunately, the budget is well prepared, monitored, and managed. Most of all, we have you; a strong, faithful, and active congregation.

Spring symbols remind us of Resurrection

When the weather turns warmer and the grass grows greener, it's easier to understand the promise of new life and renewed hope that Christians proclaim as "**Easter people**". The reminders are all around us so be sure to keep an eye out on your next spring stroll.

Birds: The robin has a red breast and a **legend** to explain it. Seems that once a gray robin flew to Christ's crown of thorns to draw out a thorn, and when it did, a drop of Christ's blood fell on its breast, leaving a stain forevermore.

Bees: It takes lots of **buzzing bees** to spread the pollen and make flowers grow. The honey these creatures create is a biblical symbol of God's favor. The Torah agrees, for it describes God's Promised Land again and again as "flowing with milk and honey."

Flowers: Long considered a symbol of hope and new life, the **daffodil** is one of the blooms most often connected to the Resurrection. Tradition says that giving a gift of daffodils will ensure happiness for the receiver.

According to tradition, the flowering shrub known as the **forsythia**, means anticipation—an appropriate companion word for Resurrection.

It is said the **dogwood tree** used to grow straight and tall, but after it was used as a crucifix for Christ, God made it short and twisted with a thin trunk so it could never be used as a cross again. The dogwood bloom has four parts, each with a rusty red color on the end and a small hole, a reminder of where the nails were driven into the cross. The center stamens look like the crown of thorns.

Faith: The traditions that developed around these spring symbols helped explain the concept that God in the flesh took on death and came back to tell us there is life on the other side. **What fantastic news!**

The Council at Nicaea in 325 AD gave the Church a revised creed. The last line reads: "We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come." As Easter people, we don't have to look further than spring for an exclamation point to that affirmation.

JFON-UMCOR What does all of this mean?

THANK YOU, THANK YOU for bringing in your Nickels and Dimes for JFON (Justice for Our Neighbors). We actually collected quarters and some bills, too! You are good! All of these gifts will help our neighbors get settled in their new land. We will report the total next month.

The Story--Our JFON network grew out of the United Methodist Committee on Relief's (UMCOR) long commitment to refugees and immigrants. Since UMCOR's founding in 1940, refugee ministry has been at the heart of its work, guided by Christian values of hospitality to the stranger.



Since 1949, UMCOR has participated in refugee resettlement in partnership with Church World Service and the

relief, development, and refugee assistance ministries of Christian denominations in the United States. Church World Service's ecumenical refugee program works with the U.S. government and local churches to coordinate the reception and placement of refugees.



For many years, UMCOR focused primarily on providing funding to those CWS projects which offer refugee and immigration services. However, after the passage of the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986 (IRCA), UMCOR also began strengthening its connections with local United Methodist congregations on immigration issues, sending information and alerts, conducting workshops, and speaking out about immigration at church events—all for the express purpose of better enabling congregations to understand and respond to the needs and concerns of our immigrant neighbors.

UMCOR established Justice for Our Neighbors in 1999. Since that time, Justice for Our Neighbors has grown to a network of 19 sites that support over 50 clinics to serve more than 5,000 clients annually.
