I can't wait for you to join me on May 1, 2021 between 11:00a.m.-1:00p.m. to participate in Family Promise's fundraising "Walk for Change". We have an opportunity to make this our most successful walk ever but I need your help.

An anonymous donor has pledged to contribute \$1 on behalf of Fisk Church for each lap we walk around Fisk. And that's a dollar for <u>each</u> person so bring the kids, your parents, and your spouse/partner! Can you complete 5 laps?

All the walking will get you hungry for sure - help yourself to hotdogs and chips anytime between 11:30a.m.-1:00p.m. Bring your own chair or picnic blanket! We need to stay socially distanced to eat so we won't be bringing lots of tables outside. Not able to walk? Come CHEER for everyone. The more noise the better!

What can we accomplish?

- \$50 raised will provide a weekly gas subsidy for two families in the Shelter Program.
- \$100 raised will provide a weekly food subsidy for a family in the Shelter Program.
- \$500 raised will provide a monthly childcare subsidy for a family in the Shelter Program.
- \$600 raised will provide a monthly rent subsidy for a family in the SAIL Program.
- \$1,000 raised will provide an educational scholarship for a parent or teen in the Steps to Success Program.
- \$1,500 raised will provide funding to prevent a family in the LIFE Program from losing their home.

Together we can make a difference for families facing homelessness in Metrowest. If you are able to make a donation, make your check out to Fisk UMC with a note in the memo line that it's for Family Promise. Checks can be dropped off at the walk or mailed to Fisk prior to the event.

MISSIONS AND OUTREACH is a mandate from the Bible. Matthew 25:35-36 tells us "For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you took me in, I was naked and you clothed me..."

The United Methodist Church is a strong-hold of mission work in the world. We have talked about UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) often arriving on the front-line of emergency situations in the world. We contribute to this endeavor through our giving, our prayers for those affected and those responding. Fisk has chosen to supply **100 Health/Hygiene Kits** annually to be used in these situations.

These Kits providing basic necessities to people who have been forced to leave their homes because of human conflict or natural disaster. Hygiene kits are also used as learning tools in personal hygiene, literacy, nutrition, and

cooking classes



Yeah! Congratulations to you! We just delivered 100 Hygiene Kits to the district Depot.

This past year it was more difficult, as many of us did not get into the stores to shop. Now it is a bit easier. All items can be left in the Parlor or the church office.

- One hand towel (15 x 25 –17 x 27 inches)
- One washcloth No microfiber cloths
- One comb—sturdy with 6 inches of teeth
- One toenail or fingernail clipper
- Bath-size soap (3-4 oz) No Jergen's or Ivory
- One adult toothbrush
- 10 adhesive bandages (¾ by 3 inches)

Wrap the items in the towel and put into a one-gallon re-sealable plastic bag.

We are now beginning to collect the 2021 Kits. I see three in the basket...need 97 more! Have your children or grandchildren help. They will learn to care for others.

New England Justice for Our Neighbors provides free, high-quality immigration legal services for eligible individuals and families, advocates for immigrants' rights and educates communities of faith and the public about ministries of hospitality with immigrants in our communities. We connect with persons seeking information and counsel through our clinic locations and website

The Story of "Y" Special Juvenile Immigrant Status

"Y" is a young woman from Guatemala who was abandoned by her father when she was very young. The mother of Y registered "Y's" uncle as "Y's" father on her birth certificate, because it was improper for a child to not have a father in her culture. "Y" never knew her real father and grew up living in extreme poverty with a mother who barely made enough to survive. As "Y" became older, gang members started threatening her so that she would become "their woman", telling her that she would lack nothing if they became the girlfriend of gang members. "Y" did not want to do this because of her Christian values and because she knew that young women who become romantic partners of gang members were often forced to sell drugs, and are often raped and murdered. "Y" fled to the United States, to escape this violence and extreme poverty and to be able to continue studying. With the help of her JFON affiliated Justice Center attorney, "Y" was able to work with the Probate and Family Court to untangle her complex family history and obtain the necessary finding that "Y" had been abandoned by her true father, so that she could become eligible for a Special Immigrant Juvenile Visa. Now "Y" has obtained a Special Immigrant Juvenile status and is awaiting the availability of the corresponding visa that will allow her to adjust her status, become a permanent resident of the United States and have the security and educational opportunity she has always dreamed of.

Do you want to help another child like "Y"? Contribute to JFON through our church. Just memo your check for JFON and it can be payable to Fisk. We just pass that amount on to JFON through the Conference.

HAPPY 50TH BIRTHDAY TO FACE CHILDREN'S CENTER

FACE, a mission of Fisk UMC, opened its doors to children on August 3, 1971. The FACE Board of Directors would like to celebrate this Golden Anniversary with a party after church on Oct 17th, so save the date. Over the next couple of months I would like to share FACE's history with the congregation. The acronym FACE stands for <u>Fisk Area</u> Community Endeavor.

When a committee of Fisk members started FACE in 1970 there were no day care centers in the Metrowest Area. The closest centers were in Boston and Worcester

The committee members felt that Fisk should be fulfilling at least one community need and identified four areas of concern in 1970: housing, day care, youth, and the elderly. The committee "decided that a day care center would be the most practical to START WITH." It took over a year and many meetings to establish the center and obtain Town approval. Twenty-one people attended the zoning board hearing to protest FACE's opening.

FACE Board members had to demonstrate that welfare mothers needed childcare before the state would fund the program. To do that, articles were put in the newspapers asking all welfare families in Ashland, Framingham, and Natick to contact their local welfare office.

The "Marcias" Hoyt and Nault repeatedly piled their seven preschool children into their station wagon and headed to Boston to obtain licenses for the daycare center. Rumor has it that one Marcia would double park with the kids, while the other would handle the governmental bureaucracy. Special recognition goes to Marcia Hoyt who has served on FACE's Board of Directors from its conception.

The original committee had to take out a loan to cover the first three months of operating expenses. Now that's a show of faith for you.

In 1981 the State of Massachusetts experienced a financial crisis and didn't pay their bills. The Men's club at Fisk provided money so teachers could be paid. The UMW has been a major supporter providing money, parties, supplies, and guest entertainers.

Many Fisk members have contributed their time and energy to ensure the success of FACE. According to the bylaws more than half of each year's Board of Directors members must be comprised of people from Fisk.

We would love to have you volunteer to be on the FACE Board of Directors. At the present time Marcia Hoyt, Debbie Friscino, Barbara Beekman, myself, and three members from the Natick community (which includes one FACE parent) serve on the Board. We meet six times a year or more as needed.

We should all be very proud of FACE and the success it has had caring for the children of our community over the last 50 years.

A message from Bishop Devadhar: Chauvin verdict

Beloved in Christ, Greetings in the precious name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

We have been collectively holding our breath for many long months as we've suffered through the dual pandemics of COVID-19 and unrelenting racism.

In the past few months, we have begun to see a ray of hope with the distribution of effective vaccines. Today, the conviction of Derek Chauvin on all charges provides a measure of justice for George Floyd and that ray of hope for all who've been waiting for accountability.

Even as we recall with anguish George Floyd's dying cry, "I can't breathe," perhaps we can now begin to exhale fear and inhale hope. George Floyd's murder prompted a worldwide movement of people of all ages and races, coming together in solidarity to address and denounce systems built on inequality and hatred. Today's verdict was a step forward in bringing justice, but there is still so much work to do.

Justice is not complete until all children of God can live together in community, with mutual respect and dignity and equity.

As proud citizens and residents of the United States, let us work to bring to reality the final words of our pledge "with liberty and justice for all."

As people of God, followers of Jesus Christ, let us join in prayer for the Floyd family as well as the Chauvin family. Let us pray for victims of violence and racism and for those who commit such acts. And may all — protestors and protectors alike — heed the call to peace and non-violence.

When we hear the voices of those crying out for justice, may we respond with the heart of Christ, so that no one has to suffer such heartbreak again.

Tonight, we exhale, though we continue to mourn the loss that brought us to this day and the thousands of others who did not receive justice.

And tomorrow let us wake up and inhale hope, with a renewed call to action and accountability for ourselves and for one another as we continue to work for God's Beloved Community.
