Reflections from Pastor Rick

It has been a whole month, and I want to thank you all for being so kind and helpful. As I have watched and listened in the past weeks, I have come to some conclusions. First, Fisk is a great church with a great tradition and history. That is something that we can build upon for today and tomorrow. Second, there are dedicated people here who work very hard for the church and for the love of the Lord. We could use some more folks to help, but that will come. Third, there is a spiritual hunger that we need to feed. Folks have been so concerned with holding things together in the past few months that some of our souls are running close to empty. All in all, I can see possibilities in the future for Fisk that are beyond even our imaginings.

What do we need to do moving forward? If we are to be the church alive and the church that creates disciples for Christ, we need to tend our spiritual fires. In the coming months, I intend to work toward this goal. I will begin a weekly Bible Study using the lectionary readings (listed elsewhere in this Messenger). We will meet at 10:30 on Tuesday mornings and have the chance to explore what the scriptures say to us individually, what they mean for Fisk United Methodist Church, and what they are saying for the world. We'll begin on Tuesday, November 19. I would also like the chairperson of each committee to begin their meetings by reading aloud the Gospel lesson for that week and then inviting the folks on the committee to explore those same questions in a 15 minute opening. That way, we shall all be listening to and sharing the same insights and be preparing for a deeper worship experience on Sunday morning.

We need to enliven and re-energize our Sunday worship. I have spoken with our choir director and we need more folks who see music and their participation as a ministry they can offer the church. I believe that worship ought to be exciting and that we should expect the unexpected. We need to leave room for the Holy Spirit to move and for Jesus to show up. I hope that you will be willing to let us do things a bit differently on occasion and sometimes to just let worship happen rather than trying to script every element of the service.

I also plan to challenge the church to conduct a six week small group ministry using a workbook I have written. We shall do this in January and the challenge is to get 75 people from the church engaged in this. The topic is "Responding to Grace".

All of this may seem to be more work, but on the contrary, all of this is an opportunity to slow our lives, take a deep breath, and let our souls be fed. Once we have been fed, we can invite others to come and join us and we will grow in spirit, in numbers, and in witness to the world.

The faithful support of you the congregation continues to be a blessing. However, we continue to find ourselves behind our Plan after nine months. As a result we are spending wisely, and carefully managing our resources:

- Your financial support is 11% below Budget, through September,
- We are spending less than our budgeted expenses to compensate, but expenses continue, and we may not be able to fully fund our valued ministries at our current rates,
- We continue to pray for improvements in our financial position.

We would urge you to review your nine month Statement of Giving which you just received, and make every effort to catch up on your commitment to Fisk's ministries. If you are current, we thank you, and ask that you consider increasing your support this year, as some of our cherished families have moved out of our area. If you have not given in the past, we would urge you to consider supporting our ministries. We began the year, and our Stewardship Plan, with the forced requirement to spend less, and achieve less. Our Plan still requires us to "borrow" from our resources in order to fund all of our planned ministries in 2013. We need your prayerful assistance.

The ministries of Fisk touch so many people in so many ways. As we enter the holiday period, we must prayerfully and purposefully work to grow our church spiritually...and our finances will follow.

COME TO THE CONCERT!

On Friday, November 8th at 7:30pm, Fisk will be presenting our own Eric Mazonson's good

friend and colleague, violinist Alexey Shabalin, in concert with Eric, performing a program of classics by Bach, Mozart and Brahms. Those of you who were present at Christmas Eve two years ago will remember Mr. Shabalin's wonderful playing.

Donations will be gratefully accepted, with all proceeds going to the church's general fund. A reception will follow the recital.

Alexey Shabalin has been Music Director and Symphony Conductor of the Rhode Island Philharmonic Youth Orchestras since 2003. Having expanded and improved under his leadership, the ensemble performed in Carnegie Hall in May, 2005. He also founded and conducts the Rhode Island Philharmonic Youth Soloists, an advanced chamber orchestra. Mr. Shabalin directs orchestral activities at Providence College and Rhode Island College, coaches chamber music at Brown University and The Rhode Island Philharmonic Music School and teaches violin privately and at The Music School.

Active as a solo recitalist and chamber player, his busy concert schedule has taken him around the world. Mr. Shabalin graduated from Moscow Conservatory in 1995, having studied with Professors Igor Besrodny and Alexander Melkinov. As a student he won third prize in the Soviet national string quartet competition in 1991. Also in 1991, he was a semi-finalist in the International Shostakovich Chamber Music Competition.

From 1992 to 1996, Shabalin toured with the worldrenowned Moscow Soloists Chamber Orchestra, conducted by famed violist Yuri Bashmet.

The Boston Globe called him "a very gifted and unusually personal violinist," and praised his playing for projecting a certain aristocratic air that is solidly *supported by technique and musicality."*

Currently he is a member of the first violin section of the Rhode Island Philharmonic Orchestra
